

We have special plans for our June 3rd meeting. We will be celebrating some significant milestones in our flotilla's history. As our flotilla marks its 45th year of service to Jacksonville. We have two individuals who have also reached significant and notable terms of service.

On 19 April 1969 USCG Auxiliary Flotilla 10-8 was chartered at the Florida Tackle and Gun Club, Jacksonville, Florida. In 1971 the USCG reorganized and Flotilla 10-8 became Flotilla 14-8. I wish that I had time to list all the members who have contributed so much time and effort to make Jacksonville's boating public safer and better educated, but this month we would like to honor two members who contributed significantly to our flotilla and the Coast Guard Auxiliary. Two men who have left an in-erasable footprint on our community.

Bob Strong celebrates 50 years of service in the Coast Guard Auxiliary

On June 24th, 1964, Bob Strong joined the Coast Guard Auxiliary in Washington, D.C.. He joined Flotilla 14-8 in March of 1978 after moving to Jacksonville. Bob was elected Flotilla Commander 5 times serving in 1982, 1990, 1991, 1998, 1999.

A majority of Bob's half century Auxiliary career has been dedicated to Flotilla Leadership, Vessel Examination and Public Education.

Member Training

After NSBW What?

In May we had several events which, bring our USCG training program philosophy out front. As we all know, we have just about the best possible training available. As long as you want it, you can talk to me or to anyone in



the our flotilla with two years or more service and get onto a website that will get you started in just about anything you want to learn to do in the Auxiliary. What do you need to do?

Simply put, starting is all you need to do. We have links that allow you to start learning right from our www.Safeboatingjax.com website. These links hook you up with training, weather, and knot-tying. We even have links on how to buy and wear your uniforms! What could be greater than that?

As we all know, the month of May featured National Safe Boating Week (NSBW.) Our Vice Division Commander, Vic Aquino said it best, when he wrote *safe boating is our priority*. This week, of all weeks in the year, is the time when we hit it hardest. Our Vessel Examination Officer can attest to that; almost every week his superior on the Division Staff is asking about what's new, better this year, and what are we doing best? I won't dwell on what is being said back and forth, but we have put a strong emphasis on Member Training and it's bearing fruit. However, your year will go on after the NSBW is past, getting ready for next year.

Ever have a situation you didn't plan? It happened to me. Whit Vick, our immediate Past Flotilla Commander, requested an Operations Specialist exam, Auxiliary Advanced Coastal Navigation (AUX ACN) which, requires the correct chart and the exam is part A and part B. Taking the exam requires ordering it through the District Help Desk. Only the Proctor, Member Training Officer, or Flotilla Commander can order it. We have worked like crazy these past two weeks to make this happen and we are almost successful. Whit passed both parts of the exam. I learned a lot this time, though. A word to the wise, give yourself plenty of time to study this material thoroughly. Before that, be sure you tell me, our AUX OP Proctor, Bob Strong or Paul Burns our FC you want that course. Give me a FIRM test date and stick to it. We can keep the materials only a short time before and after the exam, before it becomes invalid. The point here is we have found out how to do this.

We also want to remind everyone to read my recent email about *Slips, Trips, and Falls*. Too many Auxiliarists are forgetting themselves and their situational awareness on the facilities on which they serve. Sector Jacksonville requires all members read this.


Information Systems

Without looking at a calendar or an outdoor thermometer, you can tell summer and boating weather are quickly approaching. This past month was humming with activity and I was busy entering many reports. Thank you everyone for submitting your hours.

I would like to write about PDF forms vs. eForms. Although either form is fine, I believe the eForms might be easier for you; I know they are easier for me.



Both types of forms look very similar, see the photos below. The one on the left is a PDF form. The one on the right is an eForm. A quick glance, you see the PDF form on the left does not have a *Submit* button in the lower right hand corner. The eForm on the right does have a *Submit* button in the lower right hand corner. Also, the PDF form has no place to type in an email address. The eForm also asks for your email address and recipients email address. When filling out an eForm, you still print a copy for your files, but after that, just click on *Submit* and you're finished. If you see another screen that asks you a few questions, it is only a reminder screen asking if you have filled in all fields. It's not necessary to fill in all fields for the report to be submitted. Just ignore this screen and click on *ok* or whatever you need to click on to make the screen go away, then proceed with the *Submit* button. In

response to your *Submit,* you will receive a receipt for your records; that way, you know the report was sent to me.

As I mentioned, both forms are fine to use, but with the PDF form, after you print your own copy, I assume you are scanning the document back into your computer and then emailing it to me as an attachment. This step can be eliminated with the eForm.

Everyone seems to be submitting the 7029 as an eForm. The other most used forms, #7030, #7038, #7039, #7046 seem to come both ways, about 50/50. It's easy to find the eForms directly from our flotilla website thanks to Paul. If you wish to give it a try, here are the steps.

- 1. Go to the Flotilla 14-8 website, www.safeboatingjax.com
- 2. From the grey bar across the top, click on the AUX MEMBERS to get a drop down menu
- 3. From the drop down menu, click on *FORMS WAREHOUSE* (4th down from top)
- 4. On the next screen, the left hand side, click on *E-Forms* (2nd down from the top)
- 5. The page that comes up, has all the above mentioned eForms, click on the button to the right of the form you wish to use

The rest should be self explanatory. The form that comes up, should look like the PDF form but can now be submitted electronically. If you wish to use the electronic form but are having trouble, please call or email me and I will be glad to help.
